Congratulations to the first woman
President of the Hellenic Republic
Aikaterini Sakellaropoulou

Presidential elections were held in Greece on Wednesday January 22, 2020 for the President of the Hellenic Republic. According to Article 32 the Greek Constitution, the President is elected for a five-year term by the Hellenic Parliament in a special session at least a month before the incumbent's term expires. The first and second rounds require a super majority of 200 out of the 300-strong body, dropping to 180 on the third. According to the recently-amended Greek Constitution, the first vote requires a 2/3 majority for a candidate to be elected to the country's highest position. President Aikaterini Sakellaropoulou who got the Electoral Votes needed to be elected is the 13th and first ever woman President of Greece.

Farewell Reception

On the 17th of December, a farewell reception took place at the Cultural Center in honor of HE. Mr. Francescos Verros, the outgoing Greek Ambassador to Lebanon, before his departure to Greece. Hellenic Ship F 451 LIMNOS Λήμνος



Three ships of the Hellenic Navy have borne the name *Limnos* (Λήμνος), named after the island of Llmnos and the First Balkan War Battle. The Greek battleship *Limnos* (1914–1932), a *Mississippi*-class pre-dreadnought battleship, the **Greek landing ship** *Limnos* (L158) (1943–1977), an *LST1*-class landing ship and the third one the Greek frigate *Limnos* (1982–present), a *Kortenaer/Elli*-class frigate.

Originally built by the United States Navy in early 1905, the **battleship Limnos** was purchased by the Greek Navy in 1914 and renamed *Limnos*. Armed with a main battery of four 12 in guns, *Limnos* was the most powerful vessels in the Greek fleet. She saw service during the Allied intervention in the Russian Civil War and the Greco-Turkish War of 1919–1922. During the war with Turkey, *Limnos* supported Greek landings in Turkey and participated in the final Greek sea-borne withdrawal in 1922. She remained in service until 1932, when she was used as a barracks ship and subsequently disarmed. During the German invasion of Greece in 1941, she was sunk in Salamis by German bombers.

The second ship was a Landing Ship built in Pennsylvania and transferred to the Royal Hellenic Navy in 1943, renamed **Limnos L 158**. She was sold to the government of Greece in January 1947, and struck from the Navy list on 23 June 1947. She was decommissioned from the Greek navy on 10 May 1977.

The third warship is en Elli-class Standard Type frigate built in a Dutch shipyard sold directly to Greece. After her commissioning in September 1982, *Limnos* (F 451), joined the Hellenic Fleet on 5 November 1982 and since then she has actively participated in several operations including Operation Ifitos, Operation Ocean Shield, Operation Unified Protector, Operation Active Endeavour, an anti-terrorism mission in the Mediterranean.





Commander Ioannis Saliaris HN Commanding Officer HS Limnos

Commander Ioannis SALIARIS HN was born in 1973 in Athens. He joined the Hellenic Naval Academy in 1992 and graduated in 1996, with the rank of Ensign, Hellenic Navy. He has served onboard STAND-ARD type Frigates in the CIC and as Operations Department Officer, Electronic Systems Department Officer and as Executive Officer. He also served as Commanding Officer of a Fast Patrol Boat (HS GRIGOROPOULOS) and was assigned as Commanding Officer of HS LIMNOS since September 2019. As a Staff Officer, he has served in the 2nd Squadron of the Hellenic Frigate Command, and as Department Head of the Communications Department in the Hellenic Fleet Headquarters. Also, he is specialized in Communications and Operations. He has attended all specialty/educational courses according to his rank and has graduated from the Hellenic Navy Staff Officers School, the Supreme Joint War College and the German Joint Forces Staff College (FueAkBW). Furthermore, he holds a MSC in Electrical Engineering, a MSC in Systems Engineering and a MA in International Relations and Security. He speaks English, German and French.

He has also been awarded with the following medals and decorations:

- 1. Medal of Military Merit, 2nd Class.
- 2. Meritorious Command Commendation Medal, 2nd Class.
- 3. Participation in Peacekeeping Missions Commendation Medal.
- 4. Participation in NATO Article 5 Missions Commendation Medal.

He is married and has two children.

More than 25 million passengers travelled through Athens International Airport in 2019.

According to official data published by the Athens International Airport's authorities, passenger traffic through Eleftherios Venizelos has increased of more than 5 per cent. Another record breaking year for Athens over the previous year, 2018.

The entire year of 2019 saw the airport's passenger traffic reaching a new record, totaling 25,57 million passengers compared to 24 in 2018, with an increase of almost 9 per cent in international passengers.

In 2019, Athens Airport registered a total of 225,628 flights.



Who is Aikaterini Sakellaropoulou?

Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis announced in a televised address on Wednesday January 15, that Mrs. Ekaterini Sakellaropoulou, the first female president of the Council of State, will be the candidate for the post of the President of the Hellenic Republic, the nation's highest position. "The time has come for Greece to open up to the future," Mitsotakis said, emphasizing that the selection breaks with tradition not only because Sakellaropoulou is female, but also because she is not a member of a political party. She is a woman who is distinguished for her modesty, her honesty and her interest in protecting individual rights. He said the choice "embodies unity and progress". The choice, for the country's highest office, "honors both justice and the modern Greek woman," Sakellaropoulou said after the announcement, thanking the Prime Minister for the candidacy. The jurist accepted the proposal and said that she will devote all her efforts to serving this high duty, as set out by the constitution. Sakellaropoulou, a Frencheducated legal expert in constitutional and environmental law, was then on track to secure more than 260 votes.

The 63 year old jurist was born in Thessaloniki, completed her studies at the University of Athens Law School in 1978, her legal training during a leave of absence from her Council of State (Greece's Supreme Court) duties at the Sorbonne, Paris II University between 1989 and 1990. Mrs. Sakellaropoulou was promoted to head of the **Council of State** in October of 2018, proposed by the ruling SYRIZA administration of that time. She has extensive experience in teaching, as well as an educational and Foreign Ministry consultant, and as an officer of the


Society for Environmental Law since 2015, and has actively worked on large cases involving the environment, including the diversion of the Acheloos River in Thessaly and the preservation of the historic refugee buildings on Alexandras Avenue in Athens. The legal expert and human rights defender is not connected to a political party. Regarding her personal life, President **Sakellaropoulou** is divorced and a mother of one, and she lives in central Athens.



World War II survivor veteran Yani Karageorgiou celebrated his 100th birthday!

Also know as Barba Yanis on the Greek island of Lesvos, his unbelievable strength made him survive the cruelest detentions of the Gestapo in Mytilene, the Pavlos Melas concentration camp of Thessaloniki, and other concentration camps in Nazi occupied Austria. In 1942, Karageorgiou with 19 men wanted to

fight the occupiers by joining the fight that was taking place in the Middle East. They ended up arrested by the Germans and sent to SS prisons. Following years of torture, many of them did not survive. Barba Yani was one of the few who survive and witnessed the liberation of Greece.

The local train service in the Peloponese to run between the towns of Diakopto and Kalavryta in Achaea reserves unique history and beauty. The Odontotos, (which means the "one with the teeth") served as the main means of transportation for those who lived in the northwestern Peloponese. Mirto Dimitriou's Origami signature

Greek artist Mirto Dimitriou's signature origami includes clothes, jewelry and paper accessories. An original initiative but also ecological since the young artist from Thessaloniki wants to send a message to support recycling and the need to search for and use environmentally-friendly materials. The artist explained how the idea of a paper collection was born. "You

cannot imagine what one can do by folding newspapers and magazines. I have made earrings and jewelry and now I have just finished a paper dress," she said, though noting that her creations can only be worn in specific weather conditions. Dimitriou loves origami and does it passionately. The art of folding to create something three-dimensional, like a dress, from a piece of paper is magical. In fact, she has already designed ten dresses, of which almost three are ready. Without sewing machines and yarns, the young artist s preparing to showcase her work in Athens and Thessaloniki. Dimitriou is the first Greek to get a diploma in teaching origami and to hold two Guinness records: one with a white paper tower and one for a huge paper owl.
