Did You know?

The Lady of Ro , Despina Achladioti

(1890-1982) was a member of the Greek Resistance during W.W.II. In 1927, she sailed with her husband from Kastellorizo island to the smaller island of Ro, where they lived secluded. Every day, Despina would raise and lower the Greek flag, despite weather conditions or war. This small act was recognized by the Greek state upon her death on 13 may 1982, when she was buried there with full military honors. She embodies a spirit of pride and determination which many Greeks identify with.

Exploring the Central Bank Museum of Beirut

The **Banque Du Liban Museum** is the first money Museum in the region to present 16 interactive stages and games.

On May 19, the Greek Community Of Beirut organized a special visit to the BDL Museum to all the members and the students enrolled in the Greek courses. Visitors were able to see a complete collection of original and rare banknotes from 1919 to date besides a selection of valuable coins dating back to 5th century B.C displayed in the numismatic gallery, covering the Persian, Hellenistic, Roman, Byzantine, Arab and Crusaders periods.

They also discovered a selection of international banknotes from 225 states, some of which are non-existent anymore; a documentary exploring the history of the currency in Lebanon, a brief introduction on the creation and circulation of money, and finally an informative video showing the process of fabrication of Lebanese banknotes and their high-tech security features. Interactive games enabled our kids to hold a 3kg real gold bar, and discover by weighting themselves on a special scale how many of them it would take to make up the entire Lebanese gold reserve.

Conference: The relations between Phoenicians and Greeks

ΦΟΙVÍKη 2500 BC-539 BC

Phoenicia Φοινίκη, an ancient Greek term meaning "deep red purple" was a thalassocratic Semitic civilization that originated in the coastal areas of Lebanon with colonies reaching Carthage and even the Atlantic Ocean, spread across the Mediterranean between 1500 BC and 300 BC. On May 11, Dr. Naji Karam, (Strasbourg University) specialized in Phoenician archeology together with Dr. Maha El Khalil Chalabi, UNESCO goodwill Ambassador and founder of the International Association To Save Tyre, and the League of the Cannanite, Phoenician and Punic Cities, exposed the interactive relations between these two major seafaring nations according to historical periods and events. The conference was followed a week later by a cultural guided journey on both archeological sites and a special visit to the artisanal village "Les Ateliers de Tyr".

The Relations between Phoenicians and Greeks Friday May 11, at 6:30 pm At the Hellenic Cultural Center Dekwaneh, Parallel Towers 232, Bloc A, 3rd floor.

According to the lecturers, Phoenicians were among the greatest traders of their time and owed much of their prosperity to trade. Phoenicia is used to allude to the major export of the region, cloth dyed Tyrian purple derived hypobranchial gland of the mollusk called Murex sea-snail, and referred to the major Cannanite port towns organized in city-states politically independent. At first, they traded mainly with the Greeks, trading wood, slaves, glass and powdered Tyrian purple, a redviolet-purple dye used by the Greek elite to color garments.

Phoenicians and Greeks

seemed to have split the sea in two: the Phoenicians sailed along and eventually dominated the southern shore, while the Greeks were active along the northern shores. The two cultures rarely clashed, and


